


Rhythm Scavenger Hunt

Great for elementary and Intermediate as a form of Assessment OF Learning in a gamified manner.

Focus: Beat subdivision and counting syllables

Steps to Facilitate

Step 1	<p>Import Bandology slides into your chosen PowerPoint platform (Microsoft PowerPoint or Google Slides).</p> <p>Steps on how to do this are at the end of the document.</p>
Step 2	<p>Go over the instructions on how to play the game with your students (slides #2-4).</p>
Step 3	<p>To ensure the safety of all students, go over the 'respect rules' (Slide #5).</p>
Step 4	<p>For each slide, have students clap and/or speak out the rhythm on the board before they go exploring.</p> <p>Then ask the class, how many syllables does each beat represent?</p>
Step 5	<p>Give the students a time limit of your choosing. Begin the timer and watch for students who may need some extra support.</p>
Step 6	<p>When the time is up, have your students regroup in a circle to share their findings. When students share their items, have them say the item in the rhythm that it is supposed to match with.</p> <p>Example: Instead of, "I chose a Saxophone Case"</p> <p>Have students say, "I chose a Sax - o - phone Case"</p>  <p>The image shows musical notation for the rhythm 'Sax - o - phone Case'. Step 7 (Optional)	<p>Once each student has shared their object of choice, turn on a metronome (or invite the class to stomp/clap a steady beat). Then have the students say their object in the rhythmic manner described in step 6 one after another without missing the beat.</p>

Step 8	Repeat steps 4-6/7 with new rhythmic patterns.
Step 9 (Optional)	<p>At the end of the game, select a few rhythmic patterns and have the students create a chart of words that makes it easy for them to remember how the rhythm sounds.</p> <p>Example: https://www.pinterest.ca/pin/69102175503422525/</p> <p>Then students can have fun recreating a video like this one: https://youtu.be/BGNBgQnxGgl</p>

Set-up:

Bandology has provided a PPTX (PowerPoint) file attached for this activity. This file will work well with Microsoft PowerPoint and Google Slides.

To import the PPTX file into Google Slides:

1. Download the PPTX file onto your Google Drive or your computer
2. Create and open a new slide deck
3. Select "File" then "Import Slides"
4. Under "Presentations," find where the PPTX file is saved and double click on it. Alternatively, under "Upload," click and drag the PPTX file into the space or choose "Select a file from your device"
5. Select which slides you want to import then select "import"
